PROGRAMS

Center for Working Families: In response to the employment and financial security needs of its neighbors, SECS began implementing a bundled-service Center for Working Families model in mid-2008. Pioneered by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, the CWF model helps low-income families reach financial stability and move up the economic ladder through a full range of essential economic supports in a convenient location.

Homeless Prevention/Emergency Assistance: Resources are available for a variety of purposes including food, clothing, rental and utility assistance. SECS may also refer client to other service providers.

Teen Career Coaching Program: After-school program added in fall 2008 to further develop the academic and professional goals of students ages 13 to 18. The program emphasizes the importance of higher education. The program has grown considerably within the past year, including an entrepreneurial component and a prospective "green" theme in summer 2010.




