PROGRAMS

Early childhood education: The program is state-licensed and accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children. For years, the Flanner House Child Development Center has provided high-quality education at a subsidized rate for low-income families. The program is values-infused and academically challenging, including a foreign language component. Data shows that children that attend are well-prepared for primary education.

Senior program: Provides socialization and quality-of-life enrichment for senior citizens 60 and older. Participants assemble daily at the center for access to an array of services, including health screenings, nutrition counseling, shopping, transportation and exercise classes. As a result, isolation is reduced and senior citizens are provided the opportunity to remain in their homes and “age in place,” hence minimizing the need for institutional placements.

Working Families Support Center: The innovative “Skills to Success” component provides job skills training, financial education, computer training and challenges participants to make lifestyle and behavioral changes that will improve their personal situation. Additionally, an array of social-service interventions for families in crisis situations is also provided for qualified families and individuals.



